

ABOUT US

In 2004, the San Antonio Express-News published a two-part article relative to the abhorrent conditions of our companion animals in San Antonio. At that time, San Antonio had by far the highest euthanasia rate of all the major cities in the United States. The controversy and concern over this issue eventually led to the implementation of an Animal Care Strategic Plan for the City of San Antonio in August 2006. The core concept of the City's Strategic Plan was to achieve a "no kill" goal by 2012. In simple terms, the goal was to make San Antonio a city in which every animal receives responsible care. In furtherance of this goal, the City engaged the help and support of a number of partners, which led to the formation of AAPAW in 2007.



AAPAW had its early beginnings with something as simple as walking through the shelter kennels daily and then sharing a list of those animals with local rescue groups so they could start the rescue process. Over the years, we have evolved into a fully coordinated rescue effort among local shelters and rescue groups. We have continued to expand by providing fundraising to assist rescue groups with their ever-growing rescue costs, as well as to help good samaritans with found, injured animals. As you can see, we are always adapting ways we can best serve our rescue group members and the community at large in managing the stray animal population and improving the welfare of animals.



The mission of Alamo Area Partners for Animal Welfare (AAPAW) is to bring animal welfare organizations, veterinarians and the community together in partnership to improve the lives of animals in the San Antonio area.

HAPPY TAILS

Dove, a female Chow Chow, was pulled from ACS in very poor shape. She was unable to be spayed due to her condition. Several months later when Dove recovered and looked like a dog again, Tejas requested a spay/neuter voucher from AAPAW to help offset the cost.

Theo, a male Chow mix, was pulled from ACS with a broken leg. He was unable to be neutered at the time of release. Tejas was able to get his leg repaired and a neuter completed with the use of a spay/neuter voucher from AAPAW. It saved Tejas some funds. When Theo healed up, he was adopted to a couple living in New Hampshire.

HAPPY TAILS

Snickers was an abandoned stray cat found with a broken leg. A good samaritan stepped-up to foster him and get him to the vet for treatment. Unfortunately, it was determined that Snicker's leg needed to be amputated. AAPAW worked with this Good Sam to locate a vet that could perform the procedure for a reasonable cost and assisted the Good Sam in locating additional grant funding from other sources (to combine with AAPAW's Good Sam funding). Snickers had a smooth surgery and is now healthy and happy.





PROGRAM DESCRIPTIONS

AAPAW provides support to the community and its rescue group members by implementing the following programs:

<u>Spay/Neuter</u> – Reducing overpopulation by increasing spay and neuter activities by providing vouchers to our rescue group members .

<u>Heartworm</u> - Investing in medical procedures to treat heart worm disease in rescued animals. AAPAW provides vouchers to our rescue group members to help offset costs.

<u>Good Samaritan</u> - Small, matching grants are provided to citizens and rescues to assist with various emergency medical treatments.

<u>Freebie Program</u> – Designed to provide free spay/neuters to members of our community in need of financial assistance in and around Bexar County. This program is currently inactive due to lack of funding.


